

Work experience opportunities




- One week is allocated at the end of the summer term of year 12 for ALL students to go on work experience.

Sixth Form Dress Code – Professional

Lanyards are a compulsory part of the Sixth Form dress code and must be worn around the neck and visible at all times whilst on school site. This is for safeguarding reasons.

 Trousers, dress and/or skirt with a formal jacket (jacket not compulsory). Smart chinos, white/black denim trousers/shorts Tailored knee length shorts Long or short sleeve shirts. Optional tie can be worn. Smart collared polo shirt/top. V-neck sweaters and jumpers. Cultural clothing. Footwear must be suitable for walking at school, including evacuating onto the field in case of an emergency. If worn, sandals must enclose the heel securely with a back. Students participating in practical lessons such as science, engineering, food or similar must have covered feet in laboratories for safety reasons. Optional attire: Specific clothing for the sports academies (rugby, football, netball and dance) must have the school logo present on all items and be sourced from the sports academies agreed suppliers, and only school branded 	 Blue jeans/denim, including ripped jeans/trousers. Tracksuits. Combat trousers. Collarless shirts or casual sports T-shirts. Sweatshirts and non-school hoodies Skirts and shorts that are not on or just above the knee. See through items of clothing. Crop tops and tank tops Strapless tops (a shoulder strap must be present). Baseball caps and hats. Clothing with slogans/logos. Flip-flops, sliders, crocs, slippers and high heeled shoes. If you are not part of the sports academies (rugby, football, netball or dance), you should be abiding by the professional dress code and should not be in SWA branded sports attire when not playing sport. 					

Transportation for 2025-2026

Please note that sixth form students **are not guaranteed** a place on the school bus. A concession is sold when there is a spare seat on a non-registered route and are sold on a **first come first served basis** so please aim to have your form completed and payment made by around mid-August. A concession will be honoured to the end of the term in which it is purchased.

To apply for a concessionary pass you will need to email Central Bedfordshire transport - mainstream.transport@centralbedfordshire.gov.uk requesting them to post a form out to you. All application forms will be sent out on the same day first class to give equal opportunity. This form is to be used for those students who wish to travel to school by bus, but who do not qualify for any kind of free or subsidised transportation.

Content and Aims

The study of History develops students' powers of analysis and their ability to organise material and write clearly and logically. It is concerned with real people and society, as well as the interpretations of evidence and the skills of rational argument. It is a popular choice in the sixth form.

Key Features

Three examinations and one coursework question.

- Unit 1 Britain transformed, 1918-1997. A study in breadth, in which students
 will learn about the extent to which Britain was transformed politically, socially
 and culturally in the years 1918-1979. Also students will study what impact
 Thatcher's government had on Britain 1979-1997.
- Unit 2 The USA, c1920-55: boom, bust and recovery. A study in depth of
 economic and social change in the USA from the post-war boom of the 1920s,
 through depression, recovery and war, to the transformation of many aspects of
 US society in the years immediately after 1945 source- based paper.
- Unit 3 The witch craze in Britain, Europe and North America c1580-1750. A study of the witch craze that took hold in the late sixteenth century.
- Unit 4 Coursework. A guestion on debates on the Holocaust

Career Considerations

A level History is a springboard to a wide range of degrees and careers, such as banking, insurance, the civil service, management and journalism. It is recognised as a qualification for entry to most degree courses, and is especially desirable for a career in law.

In studying History students develop a number of skills that are transferrable into a variety of career options. The practise of applying past lessons to resolve present problems, and the ability to be have an analytical view when faced with a variety of situations and challenges, would be relevant in the fields of business, politics, marketing, advertising and public relations. The research skills and historical understanding would allow students to pursue careers in teaching, academia, archiving and heritage.

KS5 Curriculum & Courses

The curriculum in the Sixth Form is one that provides:

- 1. Academic success
- 2. Stimulation and challenge
- 3. Choice and diversity
- 4. Progression onto a range of post Sixth Form options
- 5. Access for all who meet the entry requirements
- 6. Encouragement for independent and life-long learning

The size of the Sixth Form means our curriculum offer at post 16 is second to none, with **38** Level 3 courses on offer. We recommend students study three courses, except those studying Further Mathematics and the most able students, who often take four. Alongside these courses, we offer a range of enrichment courses including: Extended Project Qualification (which is highly regarded by universities), Level 3 mathematical studies and many more timetabled and non-timetabled enrichment opportunities such as Duke of Edinburgh.
