- <u>Private Study</u>: In addition, there will be an expectation that you complete 2 hours of additional work independently from a given list. For example, extra reading, watching of appropriate film/tv, revision for assessment.
- All assessments should be hand-written unless you have exam arrangements.
- Phones should not be seen or heard in lessons unless directed to use them by your teacher for a specific task.

Summer task!

• Suggest a marketing strategy to sell your approach to consumers, Mention the therapies that will solve their problems.
