



Apprenticeship Providers



Focus on Apprenticeships



- Apprenticeships were developed to help address the skills shortage in UK businesses.
- They provide a way of combining learning with on the job training, which helps build solid, professional skills transferable from one organisation to another.
- Apprenticeships can last from one to five years and may be longer if undertaken part-time.
- They result in a professional qualification.
- Employers pay a salary and tuition fees are covered by the employer and the government.



LEVEL 2 Intermediate apprenticeships

Typical length 12-18 months

Entry requirements: None or few

Qualifications obtained: GCSE, BTEC or equivalent

Who's it for? Mostly for 16-year-olds with limited or no academic qualifications.




Typical length 12-24 months

Entry requirements: Usually 5 GCSEs

Qualifications obtained: A levels or equivalent

Who's it for?

Mostly for 16-year-olds with reasonable academic achievements but who don't want to study in sixth form.





LEVEL 4/5 Higher apprenticeships

Typical length 3-5 years

Entry requirements: A levels or equivalent

Qualifications obtained: Higher national diploma / foundation degree

Who's it for?

Mostly for those who want to qualify for professional career paths without attending university / college. Sometimes referred to as 'school leaver' or 'non-graduate' Programmes.

LEVEL 6/7 Degree apprenticeship

Typical length 3-7 years

Entry requirements: At least 2 A levels or equivalent

Qualifications obtained: A BA or BSc degree or higher

Who's it for?

Mostly for those with excellent sixth form results that want to study for a degree or similar whilst working. Aimed at attracting high-calibre candidates to bridge professional skills gaps.



Degree Apprenticeships (Levels 6 and 7)



- Developed by universities, professional bodies and employers, they offer the chance to qualify with a bachelors or masters degree whilst working.
- Time is split between work and study (80%/20%).
- There are no tuition fees to pay these are covered by the employer and the government.
- Salaries usually range between £7k-18k p/a but can be higher e.g Metropolitan Police £38k.

Degree apprenticeship or University?



Pros of a degree apprenticeship

- You'll get real-life experience working alongside your degree.
- Your degree is fully paid for, so there's no cost to you.
- You'll get paid a salary just like a normal employee.

Cons of a degree apprenticeship

- You'll need to balance working and studying at the same time.
- You won't qualify for any student loans.
- Apprentices don't always get the traditional 'university experience'.
- Not as many subjects on offer

SETTING THE SCENE UNIVERSITY AND COLLEGES ADMISSIONS SERVICE (UCAS)





- Central organisation through which applications are processed for entry to <u>full-time</u> higher education (HE) courses in England, Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland
- They operate on behalf of all full-time higher education courses at member institutions

THE UCAS JOURNEY











- I. Potential applicant researches and finds a course, goes to Open Days
- 2. Registers online with UCAS Apply in school start during June 2025
- 3. Completes form and processes payment <u>£28.50</u> e.g. October 2025
- 4. Academic reference added by school / college
- 5. School sends electronically to UCAS deadline Jan 2026
- 6. UCAS processes form and forwards to chosen universities
- 7. Universities submit decisions (offer or unsuccessful)
- 8. Applicant views decisions on UCAS Hub
- 9. Applicant replies to offers on UCAS Hub (Firm / Insurance) deadline 5th

June 2026

- 10. (Might choose accommodation with firm choice university)
- II. Student and parents apply for **Student Finance** deadline **May 2026**
- 12. Universities confirm places when results are released August 2026

Foundation degrees



- Not just for art and design courses
- Many subject degrees now offer a foundation year
- 'Year 0' rather than Year 1
- Extra year to prepare you for undergraduate study
- Different entry requirements to the degree ideal if you have lower A level grades
- Can apply for a mixture of courses in your five choices e.g. 2 courses Year 0 (foundation) and three Year 1 (degree)

<u>KEY FEATURES OF</u> Admissions Scheme



- Maximum of <u>5</u> choices
- 4000 character <u>personal</u> statement three sections
- Some choice restrictions:
 - Medicine, Veterinary, Dentistry max 4 choices in one field
 - Oxford <u>or</u> Cambridge you cannot apply to both
- 'Invisibility' (blind universities can't see your other choices)
- Fee £28.50 Free for Free School Meals Waived fee

Personal statement



Parents: What can you do to help?

- Encourage participation e.g. helping at scouts; sports teams; hobbies and spare time activities
- Part-time jobs
- Extra reading in interesting topic areas
- MOOCs Massive Open Online Courses
- Research and visiting universities for open days
- 'Interested and interesting'



You'll want to show evidence of passion, curiosity and interest, this might include:



Remember these are just some examples, you don't need to include it all. The key is to research the course(s) to find out what might be most relevant.





Q2: How have your qualifications and studies helped you to prepare for this course or subject

Focus on what's most recent and relevant to your subject or course(s), examples could include:

How your studies or training relate to chosen course(s) or subject area:

- This could be your current or previous studies.
- This could be from any form of formal education – think school, college, training, or short online courses.

What relevant or transferable skills have you got that make you a great

- Are there a couple of subjects that helped you develop a core set of relevant skills required for your chosen course(s).
- Maybe a particular module or project helped you understand where your interests and strengths lie.

Any relevant educational achievements

- Universities and colleges will see your grades on your application don't waste space talking about these.
- Focus on your other accomplishments like a competition, holding a position of responsibility or representing the school/college.

Remember these are just some examples, you don't need to include it all. The key is to research the course(s) to find out what might be most relevant.



Q3: what else have you done to prepare outside of education, and why are these experiences useful?

Examples should be reflective and demonstrate further suitability for your subject or course(s), this could include:

Work experience,	Personal life	Hobbies and any	Achievements
employment, or	experiences or	extracurricular or	outside of school
volunteering	responsibilities	outreach activities:	or college
 In-person or virtual work experience. Paid for work or volunteering. The key thing is reflection on the experiences and the skills gained relevant to your chosen course(s). 	 Is there a situation you've personally overcome that has influenced your decision? Are there personal experiences that have helped you develop essential qualities for the course? 	 Think sports, reading, community work, summer schools. Any activities outside of core studies that help further showcase why you'd make a great student. 	 This could be a position of responsibility for local clubs or groups, competitions, or qualifications you've attained outside of the classroom.

UCAS KEY DATES



Completed applications, including our reference, should be sent to UCAS by the following dates:

- **I6th October 2025** for dentistry, medicine, veterinary science and veterinary medicine and for all courses at the University of Oxford and the University of Cambridge.
 - Entry tests may have an earlier date. Students need to register 2 weeks in advance
- Conservatoires e.g. music performance have their own early deadline e.g. 1st October 2025
- 31st January 2026 for all other courses. SWA has a December deadline for all applications to be sent to UCAS
- 24th March 2026 for some Art and Design courses except those listed with a 15th January deadline.

These are assumptions based on deadlines for this current year

<u>UNIVERSITY &</u> COLLEGE DECISIONS



- Admissions tutors can make one of three decisions:
 - Conditional Offer
 - Unconditional Offer
 - Unsuccessful
- April/May 2026: Applicants then keep a maximum of two offers:
 - Firm
 - Insurance
- Any remaining offers must be declined

<u>CONFIRMING YOUR</u> PLACE – AUGUST 2026



- I. Results day: Exam results are issued to applicant
- 2. Admissions staff check if you have matched the conditions of their offer
- If yes, you will be sent an official confirmation of your place on UCAS and via email. Well done!
- 4. If no speak to the sixth form team straight away



Results Day 2025 = 14th August

Results Day 2026 = 13th August

Other incentives


